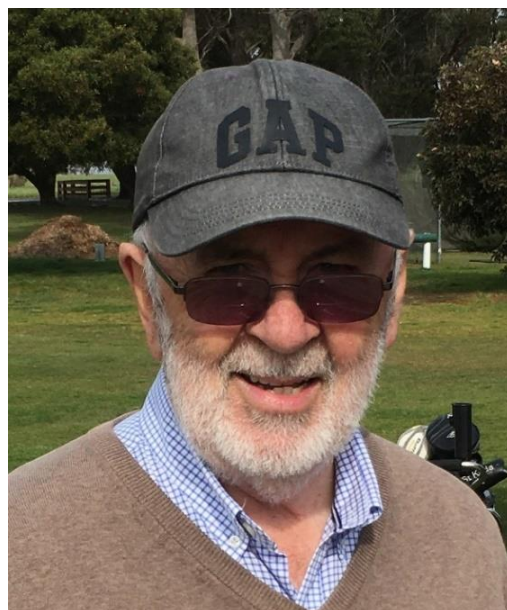


Covid 19 – We all have responsibilities to stay safe

All businesses, including licensed premises have mandated responsibilities to ensure the safety of their members and patrons at all times. The government has provided guidelines and rules that must be followed and are being enforced by health and other officials. Not only do we need to ensure that we follow the rules for our own safety, we must comply so that our Club can keep trading under present restrictions.

It is easy to become complacent because Tasmania has not recorded any new cases for a long time, however one only has to see what is happening throughout the rest of the world to realize that we could just as easily suffer another wave of Covid that could trigger further restrictions.

To ensure the Club continues to follow the rules, committee member Tony Simpson has taken on the role of planning and documenting our responsibilities. Whilst they seemed onerous at first, Tony has done an excellent job in preparing the appropriate documentation and putting processes in place for all members to follow. After all, Tony was an auditor with the post office in a previous life. Apart from practicing safe social distancing and ensuring hand cleanliness, all members are required to wipe their tables down before they leave with the cloths and sanitizing spray provided. Please follow all the directions put into place so that we can not only stay safe but can continue to trade rather than being closed down due to non-compliance.



Cash Register

The new cash register has arrived and will come into operation from 8 October. Members more likely to use the register have or will very soon receive training in its use although the machine is very intuitive and is easier to use than a mobile telephone (Just saying Tony Dick).

What this means for the Club is that every transaction either by cash or EFTPOS must be recorded on the cash register. Any person who intends to go behind the bar and put money into the cash register must enter the



product and value into the machine. Under no circumstances is the drawer allowed to be left open and items paid for without them being registered on the till. If you are not comfortable in operating the cash register you will not be allowed behind the bar. In any case it is against Liquor and Licensing laws to serve drinks from the bar unless you hold or are in the process of obtaining a Responsible Service of Alcohol Certificate. As severe penalties can apply against the Club for contravening those laws there will be no exceptions to these rules.

The new register will account for all funds received by the Club and will automatically allocate the funds to the appropriate accounting areas, making the treasurer's job so much easier, providing everyone who handles the register does the right thing. It will also allow for better future planning and stock control.

If anyone is doubtful about the use of the register, please see Hank Timmerman, David Dunham, Mike or Wendy Smith who will assist.

Club Hire Cart Maintenance

If you are asked or have taken it upon yourself to help by putting the hire carts back into the container shed, can you please ensure that

- before they are put away any rubbish in them has been removed and the carts are **clean**, and
- when they are put back into the container that the **key has been turned to the OFF** position. The charger plug must be pushed firmly into the socket under the centre of the seat. Once plugged in, wait about four seconds and the needle on the gauge of the charger should move past the 5 amp position. If the needle has not moved and no audible hum can be heard, **please check to ensure the plug has been pushed in far enough.**

Your assistance with these matters will ensure that the carts are always ready for re-hire and they will remain in service for an indefinite period.

What's in the little green sheds? – submitted by Neville Smith



Ever wondered what's in the green shed on the 5th and the green shed on the 4th? These are our pump sheds. The one on the fourth contains our transfer pump which transfers the water from Panatana Rivulet when it floods over into our little storage dam. We are only allowed to use the water that comes into our dam when the rivulet is high enough to let the water flow into the dam via our laser cut ditch which was precisely cut as per the requirements of the Rivers and Water Supply authority. The reason for this is that we are not to take all or more water than necessary so that properties downstream from us still have flowing water. Once there is a reasonable amount of water in the dam the pump is started to transfer the water to our main

storage dam to the south of the practice fairway. This system was originally installed with the aid of a dollar for dollar grant from the government and because we were utilizing water that would only flow out to sea and be wasted, it was considered the most purposeful grant application of the year.

The green shed on the fifth is our main pump shed which contains our 22 kilowatt irrigation pump, the 3 kilowatt jacking pump, the 2.2 kilowatt bore pump and all the solenoids and the computer that controls our course watering.

The main irrigation pump is the primary unit for pumping water out of our 2 dams either side of the 6th fairway all over the course to tee beds, fairways and greens. Under our course lies literally many kilometers of pipes of all sizes that carry the water when required (there are also many pipes under the fairways for drainage as well). The jacking pump is the pump that sends water to our solenoids to maintain constant water pressure on the system, when a solenoid is activated by the computer the sprinklers come up and the associated area on



our golf course is watered, whether it be a tee bed, a green, the fairways or the practice green. The jacking pump also operates the sprinklers on the dams which are a nice feature. The bore pump is simply an additional pump to supply water from underground into one of our dams to help with our supply. The bore pump is approximately 30 meters underground and it is under the little silver cover near the pump shed.



The main pump shed recently had an electrical upgrade with a new inverter and a new switchboard installed. The inverter was faulty and had to be replaced and the switchboard was



40 years old and needed upgrading to safer and better technology.

The inverter controls the main irrigation pump keeping the water in the pipes at a constant pressure and controlling the speed of the pump appropriately.

The water at the clubhouse is supplied on a different system, from the green tank beside the lady's amenities and another underground tank near the workshop. These both catch the rainwater from the workshop and clubhouse roofs.

A lot of money and time has gone into our watering systems with most of the time being voluntary.

All our systems are latest technology, reasonably complex, but maintain our course to the great standard that we have to play on today.
