This was all to the Thirlstane Golf Clubs advantage as Rodger joined the old named club Shearwater and took over as Treasurer around mid-1970's we think, taking over from Harry Overton.

From our humble beginning at the old course at Shearwater to where we are today Rodger has been there doing a million things, to name a few - Treasurer, Bar Manager, Course Superintendent, controlling the watering, attending to break ins during the night at the club

house and workshops, chasing parts for machinery and watering equipment, fixing machines, organising fuel, picking up lunches, the list goes on and on. A quick calculation would show that Rodger has travelled about 1,000,000 kms or more for our club during his time so far and even turned a spare bedroom in his house into his office. If you have dealt with Rodger you would know that everything is organised, in order and his writing is as neat as you will find. He never had a computer, never wanted to use one, but everything was in order and he knew where everything was — even most of the pipes under our golf course.

When the move to our new premises at Thirlstane occurred in 1980 Rodger was running the bar from the boot of his car ably supported by Jock Stephens and of course Maureen. Rodger is a Life Member and both he and Maureen are Foundation Members. Maureen is currently the longest running Ladies member of the club.

We think he gave the game up about 1987 when he was only about 43 years of age. Roger and Maureen won many competitions in their own right and together in mixed events. Both played pennant for the club and have their names on various honour board listings and trophies in the clubhouse.

The flag is not to be pulled out with multiple balls in the hole under any circumstances. The use of fingers to retrieve a golf ball is the preferred method.


Protection of Young Trees

<u>Purpose</u>. To prevent damage to young trees when a player makes a stroke, a Committee can choose to designate them as a no play zone so that:

- If a player has any type of interference as defined in Rule 16.1 from such a tree designated as a no play zone, he or she must take relief under Rule 16.1f.
- If the player's ball lies in a penalty area, he or she must either take free relief under the Local Rule within the penalty area or proceed with penalty under Rule 17.1.

Such trees should be identified by stakes, ribbons or in some other clear way.

When the tree has matured and no longer needs this protection, the Committee should withdraw the Local Rule and/or remove the identifying stake or ribbon from the tree.



Dry Ground for Winter

A group of energetic labourers have combined with some welcome mechanical assistance to provide a gravel buggy parking area adjacent to the second tee bed.

The work has been completed just in time for winter, in an area which has degenerated into a mud-patch in previous years.

This work follows a recent project to upgrade and re-sow the second tee bed, removal of several problem trees and stumps, and rehabilitation of areas of damage.

This is all part of extensive on-going course management, ranging from the critical tasks of maintaining the greens, bunkers, fairways and tee beds, to machinery maintenance and some less obvious but equally important tasks.

For example, members who recently visited the Launceston Golf Club and noticed their challenges with leaves, bark and other debris, will especially appreciate the work done each week by Phil Walden to keep our course in pristine condition, as well as the maintenance of the decorative gardens by Lorraine Smith.

As President Bevis Dutton detailed at the recent annual general meeting, up to 20 volunteers work each week to ensure that Thirlstane maintains its reputation as one of Tasmania's outstanding courses.
