All members with remote controlled buggies are asked to keep their buggies within two meters of the operator and to avoid moving their buggies when others are playing shots, especially around the greens.

Several trees have been identified with yellow tape - these will be dealt with over the next few weeks. The trees are not targeted for removal but require limb removal and preventative measures.

New Buggy Shed

The new buggy shed has been wired by a team of TGC veteran sparkies who are all very proud of their efforts and I must add was completed in <u>under 2</u> days.

The works included the following:

- · Adding a new 3 phase circuit breaker to the workshop sub-board.
- · Installing a new 3 phase sub-main from the workshop underground to the new buggy room.
- · Installing a new sub-board with a kilowatt hour meter and protection for all circuits by RCBO,s.
- Installing 17 double power points.
- · Installing 4 internal low bay led lights controlled by a movement sensor.
- · Installing 1 exit light.
- · Installing 2 external security lights.
- · Installing a communication conduit underground for security works by others.
- · Trenching and backfilling.

Chris Hinds, John Nichols, John Murphy and Neville Smith were the electrical crew and we were ably assisted by Tony Dick and Les Finarty who assisted with trenching, backfilling, seed sowing and levelling. Tony ,Les and Mike Rataj also constructed the cart entry and relocated the buggy wash water line.

Tony has since installed timber panelling to the walls so that no one damages the new building and John Nichols and John Murphy have coated the floor and the timber-work with a protective sealer.

I believe the buggy shed is another project to be proud of and trust that those that store their buggies within appreciate everyone's efforts.

The General Committee are delighted with the new shed. The Eureka Shed was purchased through Richardson Sheds at 4 Export Drive in Ulverstone. Kim and Mel Richardson arranged the purchase. We discovered that Kim (Poud) Richardson is a Member of the Club and plays with his mates on Sunday mornings. Kim approached us and offered to build the shed with his mates who are also Members, at basically no cost. We would like to recognise Poud and his friends, Ian Abley, Bob Curran, Kevin Pearce and Peter Smith for their good work and generosity.

Lost Balls and Slow Play

Rule 8.2 states the following:

Ball Lost or Out of Bounds

Stroke-and-Distance relief must be taken when a ball is lost or out of bounds.

When Ball Is Lost. A ball is lost if not found in **three minutes** after the player or their caddie begins to search for it.

If a ball is found in that time but it is uncertain whether it is the player's ball:

- The player must promptly attempt to identify the ball (see Rule 7.2) and is allowed a reasonable time to do so, even if that happens after the three-minute search time has ended.
- This includes a reasonable time to get to the ball if the player is not where the ball is found.
